From the Pastor

Who could have imagined that we would be gearing up for the start of the school year under these conditions?

Earlier this summer when we were making worship plans using Zoom all the way through Christmas, I thought we were being overly-cautious, but now it appears that we don't have any idea of how/when we will worship in the same physical space again. As we've learned, physically worshipping together is a dangerous activity. Even if we do not sing together, just sitting together for an hour in the same space risks spreading the coronavirus. Even our parking lot worship has proven to be a challenge because church people are like magnets and metal: get near each other you can't keep up apart.

The challenge of being a church together has never been more daunting. We have decided to

put some serious prayer, research, thought and discussion into the issue of worshipping at Peace Prez. To this end, Pat Wilson (chair of the worship committee) and I are reaching out to YOU, members of the congregation, to get your ideas, concerns and opinions about worshipping together. We will do this in two ways:



1. Listening Time After Worship Sept. 30

In order to hear your ideas and concerns, we will have a "listening time" after worship on Sunday, September 20, starting at about 11:30am. The pastors and worship planners will stay online until we hear from everybody who has something to say.

Immediately after our Zoom worship on Sunday, September 20, rather than having a time of fellowship after the benediction, we will listen to your opinions and ideas. Please keep

your eyes and ears open about what other churches are doing and what the experts are saying. Then bring your ideas to this after-worship discussion so we can consider all the possibilities. The Worship Committee and Session, advised by family practitioner Robin Councilman, MD, will make the plans and set the program, but we need to hear your thoughts and ideas as we move forward in making these plans.

2. Online, Paper or Phone Survey



We will prepare a brief survey online (using Survey Monkey) and in written form to get your ideas and

opinions. The survey will be sent out in the Mid-Week Update next week and mailed to the homes of those of you without internet access. In addition, volunteers will make some telephone calls as well.

We all yearn to “go back to church,” but remember the image of magnets and metal. Even if we can figure out how to hold a worship service, it will be very different. For example, a likely scenario would have you park and then wait in your car until a volunteer wearing personal protective equipment escorts you into the church and to a seat in the sanctuary. You would sit by yourself or with your household, at least six feet apart from other people during the worship service. There would be no unison singing. After the worship service, you would remain in your pew until a volunteer escorts you out. It will be very different from regular worship because our regular worship

experience is not just sitting, listening, reading aloud and praying in a worship service. It is the greeting in the beginning, the passing of the peace during, the shaking hands after and the ever-so-important coffee fellowship afterwards. It is sad but true: All those contact activities are too dangerous.

It may be possible for Peace Prez to be able to plan and carry out some fellowship activities in a safe way -- likely in smaller groups -- but it is most likely that these gatherings will NOT be before or after worship.

Please know that, as your pastor, I am committed to putting in some serious time and effort to figuring out a way for us to move forward together and invite you to join with me to figure out the next steps. These are uncertain times. There are no blueprints. We have to make this up as we go along. Beginning this process of listening, planning, thinking, researching and discussing, we follow the advice of Martin Luther King: “Take the first step in faith. You don’t have to see the whole staircase, just take the first step”.

2020 Peace & Global Witness Offering


September and October is the time when the Presbyterian Church (USA) receives an annual offering to support the work of peacemaking across the world. There are both national and local components to the offering:

- 50% of each congregation's offering supports the PCUSA Mission Agency in their work advocating for peace and justice around the world.
- 25% stays with your congregation for your own peacemaking work.
- 25% is directed to one or more organizations selected by the PTCA Mission & Witness Committee.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic and resulting economic struggle and unemployment, the Presbytery Mission Committee has decided to focus the PTCA portion of this offering toward meeting the need of **food insecurity**. It will go to support Feeding America, which works with Second Harvest Heartland in the Twin Cities and STEP locally.

COVID Has Changed Our Model, But Not Our Spirit

For all of the challenges and difficulties before us, the sense of comradery at STEP is palpable. Despite the changes, STEP is still STEP.

It seems generous to call these last several months a challenge. **We at STEP have had to make significant adjustments to our operations to keep people safe and make sure that our neighbors get the food and assistance they need.** Our volunteer crew—once our largest workforce—has gone from 120 to about 16. And since we can no longer safely have clients come in to shop, our small crew of staff and volunteers are getting grocery orders ready for curbside pick-up. This has been a challenge, but with our mission in mind, we have set out to do our best.

For many years STEP has offered a client choice shopping model. Often choice is taken from people with limited resources, which is why we have committed ourselves to finding solutions that offer as much choice as possible to anyone needing assistance. When it became evident that we needed to close our building to the public, we searched for a food distribution model that offered as much choice as possible. Now when someone needs food, they call in to place an order and choose a pick-up time. Once

the order is placed, we pack those orders and get them ready for pick-up. All orders are picked up at the back door, keeping best practices of social distancing and masking at the forefront.

We are asked regularly if/when we will be open again for shopping, and to that we have no good answer beyond “Soon, we hope.” But those questions are quickly followed by expressions of gratitude and encouragement to stay healthy and safe. Clients who have lost wages due to COVID tell us the relief they feel that they can still feed their families healthy meals despite all the other uncertainties they face. We all see the smiles under the masks, and we wish each other well until the next time we meet.
